## Holtville High Seniors Set Sights on Future

The Class of 2021 Saw 128 Graduates Walk in Front of Friends and Family on Thursday, June 3

HOLTVILLE — Though the school year had essentially ended, Holtville High School Class of 2021 salutatorian Jonathan Villagomez Bastidas decided to impart one last lesson during the seniors' commencement ceremony on Thursday, June 3.

During his remarks to his peers and those assembled, he asked that students reflect warmly on the friends that they made and may be leaving behind as they embark on the next chapter in their lives.

He implored the teachers to think fondly of the students who they had seen mature into young adults under their watchful eyes. And he encouraged parents to balance any anxiety

they may have about their growing children with a sense of pride in their accomplishments.

"This ceremony here is a moment in life when you realize how fast time passes by," Villagomez Bastidas said. "I hope it encourages anybody here to slow down once in a while and truly enjoy the life they live because you can only live it once."

All told, a total of 128 seniors graduated from Holtville High School during the commencement ceremony.

Of those, 72 graduated with an overall grade-point average above 3.0, while 42 had a GPA greater than 3.5, Principal Anthony Arevalo said.

Prior to the start of the graduation, 18-year-old Rodrigo Villareal said he was feeling mixed emotions. Although he said he was extremely proud of his classmates for having started and completed the year amid the COVID-19 pandemic, he regretted their time together was coming to an end.

"This is the last time I'm going to be together with my friends before we part ways," Villareal said.

This fall, he is scheduled to begin classes at Imperial Valley College, where he will study engineering and automotive technology.

"I have a passion for cars," he said. "It's something I really like and I'm pretty sure I'm going to enjoy it."

Until then, Villareal has plans to look for some part-time work and spend time with friends over the summer. As challenging as the school year was, Villareal said he was glad that toward the end he and his classmates were able to enjoy a number of activities, including prom.

## Holtville Girls State Delegate Warms Up to Politics

Incoming Senior Vera Smith to Represent the Bradley-Keffer Auxiliary Later this Month

HOLTVILLE — Though 17-year-old Holtville resident Vera Smith said she has long had her heart set on becoming a registered nurse, the idea of seeking public office has increasingly enticed her.

So much so that with college a little more than a year away for the incoming Holtville High senior, Vera said she has been considering pursuing a degree in political science to possibly help cement her political aspirations.

"It would be cool to run," Vera said, as she ticked off the public offices she envisioned herself potentially one day holding, including that of governor. "But I'm not sure which elected position I'd prefer."

Yet, some of that uncertainty may be resolved later this month, when Vera takes part in the 78th annual American Legion Auxiliary California Girls State conference as the chosen delegate of Holtville's American Legion Bradley-Keffer auxiliary Post 138.

The six-day conference teaches female high school students about the political process by having them operate a state-level mock government as members of the fictional "Federalist" or "Nationalist" parties. Some 540 delegates from throughout the state are scheduled to gather online between June 28 to July 3 for the 2021 session.

The program is eligible to young women with high academic standing and who confess a strong affini-

## Poe's Final Stop is Last Free Place

Family of Slain Trans Man Wants Answers, Cousin Intends to Ask Questions at Slab City

NASHVILLE — Lori Brammer speaks with a thick, melodic Southern drawl, the kind one might expect from a woman raised in Tennessee.

She has no idea where Imperial County is — "so, is Imperial County

south of San Diego?" — but she plans to be here on June 26 regardless.

And she'd never heard of Slab City before the unthinkable caused her to catch up on her geography with lightning speed. Yet now, she plans to make that part of her trip as well.

### Boards to Fill Vacancies Prompted by Gonzalez-Buttner's Sentencing

Plans are underway to fill the respective vacancies left on the county Board of Education and the Imperial Community College District board following the sentencing of former trustee Annette Gonzalez-Buttner on Thursday, June 3.

Gonzalez-Buttner was sentenced to serve three years of jail time and one year of supervised probation in connection to being convicted of four felony counts partially related to election fraud on April 23.

She was immediately remanded into the custody of the county Sheriff's Office after county Superior Court Judge Christopher Plourd denied her defense attorney's request to allow Gonzalez-Buttner to remain free on bail pending an appeal of the sentence.

The county Board of Education is proceeding with the next steps to fill the vacancy in accordance with its board policy and as required by law.

Because Gonzalez-Buttner's term on the board was not scheduled to expire until De-

cember 2022, the board must either make a provisional appointment or hold an election within 60 days of the vacancy.

That vacancy officially started on the day of her sentencing, Thursday, June 3, county Office of Education Superintendent Dr. Todd Finnell.

Gonzalez-Buttner had been suspended from both boards after being convicted on April 23.

For its part, the Imperial Community College District board is scheduled to host a special meeting to discuss the options available to fill its vacancy at noon Wednesday, June 9.

"Our legal counsel is currently researching the options and will present them to the board," said Elizabeth Espinoza, Imperial Valley College interim communications and government relations officer.

Its board's bylaws also state that the board must either order an election or make a provisional appointment within 60 days of the vacancy.

If an election is ordered, it would be held on the next regular election date no sooner than 130 days after the vacancy occurred, the board's bylaws stated.

Gonzalez-Buttner was elected to the board, which governs Imperial Valley College, in November 2020.

A jury had found Gonzalez-Buttner guilty of perjury by declaration related to a 2017 candidate intention statement, filing a false declaration of candidacy, grand theft and perjury by declaration related to a falsified driv-

er's license renewal form.

Based on the evidence and testimony presented at trial, the jury determined that Gonzalez-Buttner moved to Santa Clara in 2014 and had established her permanent residence, or domicile, outside of Calexico, the area she was elected to represent on the Board of Education.

A hearing is set for Thursday, June 10 to determine whether Gonzalez-Buttner, 56, will be granted bail pending the appeal of her sentence.

Hours after being booked into custody, a written statement originating from Gonzalez-Buttner's personal email was sent to this newspaper and which included three letters that were submitted to the court in support of a motion for a new trial.

Two of those letters were respectively authored by Gonzalez-Buttner's brother and sister-in-law, while the third she wrote herself.

On the morning of Friday, June 4, defense attorney Cremeans contacted this newspaper to request that the contents of the letters not be published, pending Gonzalez-Buttner's next court appearance.

Although Judge Plourd had determined that Gonzalez-Buttner was eligible for probation, he stated that the nature and seriousness of her crimes negated her being granted probation in place of incarceration. Gonzalez-Buttner will serve out her sentence in the county jail.

"I don't think overall that she is a suitable candidate for pro-

bation," Plourd said prior to handing down the sentence at the Brawley courthouse's east department.

Throughout her trial, the defense had presented testimony and evidence that attempted to prove Gonzalez-Buttner had moved temporarily to Santa Clara to attend college and enroll her children in public schools that provided a better education than in Calexico.

During the sentencing hearing, Plourd stated that he interpreted some of that same testimony and evidence as suggestive of a cover up by Gonzalez-Buttner after she became aware that she was being accused of living outside of Calexico.

"For all practical purposes she's been a resident of Santa Clara since 2014 and she made up a cover story that made no sense legally," Plourd said. "I do not believe that Ms. Buttner for one moment believed that her domicile was in Calexico."

Prior to her sentencing hearing, the court heard arguments during a hearing for the defense attorney's motion for a new trial. Although the motion had argued

that there was insufficient evidence to convict Gonzalez-Buttner of the charges, Plourd determined that there was "overwhelming evidence" that the defendant had indeed relocated to Santa Clara County on a permanent basis.

"I don't think the jury got it wrong," he said.

Nor did he agree with Cremeans's assertion that the jury did not receive proper jury instructions and should not have been allowed to examine the question of Gonzalez-Buttner's domicile.

Gonzalez-Buttner's three years of incarceration represent the middle term for the perjury conviction related to the 2017 candidate intention statement, the most serious count of the four charges she had faced, Plourd said.

He stayed the two respective two-year sentences associated with the convictions of filing a false declaration of candidacy and grand theft.

The grand theft charge was related to Gonzalez-Buttner having received health benefits and stipends under false pretenses while on the Board of Education. Those expenses totaled about \$164,000, it was disclosed during the sentencing hearing.

As part of her probation terms, she was ordered to pay back the full amount as restitution. A restitution hearing was scheduled for July 19.

The court also imposed a one-year sentence for her conviction for the perjury charge related to the falsified driver's license renewal form, which had listed a Calexico address instead of the address where she had been residing in Santa Clara. That one-year-term represented one-third of the three-year middle term that the court decided to impose.

In her argument to have Gonzalez-Buttner placed on probation instead of being incarcerated, Cremeans told the court that the county Probation Department considered her a low-risk offender, that she had always believed that her permanent residence existed in Calexico, was the primary caregiver of two of her youngest children, and had the ability and experience to find employment.

"She was never trying to rip off the people of Calexico," Cremeans said. "She was trying to represent them."

During her sentencing hearing, county Deputy District Attorney Anthony Valente stated that the DA's Office had considered investigating Gonzalez-Buttner for potential crimes related to her candidacy filings for the ICCD trustee seat but decided against it.

"The people have chosen to proceed with the current charges and not proceeded on that issue," Valente said.

He further indicated that her conviction essentially barred her from holding public office ever again.

Public records on file with the county Registrar of Voters indicate that Gonzalez-Buttner's listed address on her ICCD candidacy filings was the same Calexico address she provided in her 2017 candidacy filing for the Board of Education seat.

on and share their love for the different characters that came to the ring erected in the parking lot outside La Fonda Bar & Grill in El Centro on Saturday night, June 5, where homegrown lucha libre, or Mexican-style wrestling, returned to the Imperial Valley after more than 15 months of exile due to strict COVID regulations.

The shine of the bright lights, the sound of the music, and the smell of tacos filled the balmy night air. Voices chattered excitedly as people set up folding chairs in bunches for families trying to observe social-distancing recommendations.

Lil' Cholo was excited to return as well.

"I'm so happy to be back. El Centro is like a second home to me," said Lil' Cholo, one of the signature performers of Imperial Valley-based Venue Wrestling Entertainment, which shut down local operations during the pandemic due to state and county health orders regarding gatherings of people.

If Public Health were a luchador, the masked men of VWE would have dropped an elbow on it from the top rope.

"We did shows once a month for five years," said Jayson Hisel, owner of VWE. "Then boom. No more shows. We depend on this. I ended up having to host shows all the way in Yuma."

VWE held its last Imperial Valley match on March 2, 2020.

"People forget that we are professional wrestlers, and many of us do this full-time," Lil' Cholo added. "So, we need to support independent professional wrestling."

Lil' Cholo has been wrestling for more than 22 years, and got his start watching lucha libre on television. Lucha libre is a professional form of wrestling that focuses on over-the-top characters — the luchadors — and a high level of showmanship many people grew up watching on Mexican channels broadcasting from Mexicali.

Little Cholo's opponent, Krazy Chaos, reflected on returning to the ring.

"We're glad to be here. No performance means no work, and for some of us this is how we take care of our family," the second-generation luchador said in Spanish.

"I love doing this. The fans, the makeup, the booze, the energy. You can have a crappy day and come to this, and none of it mattered," said Krazy Chaos,

who is originally from Juarez, Mexico.

Imperial County Public Health Department regulations weren't the only thing that held VWE back from getting restarted recently. After the county allowed the show to go on, Hisel said he then had to find a location that would host his event.

While many venues were nervous to do so this soon after the easing of COVID restrictions, Hisel said he finally found a home for "Aftermath," the name of Saturday's event, with Antonio Camacho, co-owner of La Fonda, who was happy to fill this void in this community.

"I saw I need. A need to get out and relax and release from all of this COVID stress. I was thrilled to be able to give that to the community," Camacho said.

One look at the sea of masked faces (not the lucha libre sort) and it was clear that there was a sense of life get back to normal. For the adults and kids alike.

John Glass of Imperial was excited to be out.

"I have been feeling really cooped up at home, and I'm tired of just sitting around watching Netflix. It felt good to be out to see something and eat some tacos and have a beer just like we used to," Glass said. "I really needed this break."

Another family came out Saturday night to celebrate their son's 11th birthday, little Frankie Lara Jr. His older sister, Mischa Lara, excitedly talked about how much she liked being able to go out to somewhere different for her brother's birthday.

"It's great. We haven't done anything like this in a long time," Mischa said. "I'm so happy it happened on my brother's birthday. Happy birthday, Frankie!"

## Gathering Celebrates Restoration of Niland Habitat, Human Spirit

**NILAND** — Nearly a year after a devastating fire destroyed his home as well as dozens of others, Barnacle Snug Luffy and his wife, Satya, are still living out of a mobile home parked on their Niland property.

And though plans call for the rebuilding of a new home on their six-acre spread near where the June 28 fire had originated, it is not the couple's top priority.

Instead, the pair have dedicated much of the last year to restoring their property on Fourth Street west of Highway 111 to its

previous condition as a certified wildlife habitat.

"We've kind of put the house on the backburner while we're trying to get the property cleaned back up so that the animals can return and have their young," Luffy recently told a local filmmaker. "To us that's what it's all about."

The Luffys' efforts have also earned them the support of the wider community, many of whom gathered for a celebration on Friday, June 4. And as Luffy and many guests had observed, the event also served to uplift the spirits of the township as it struggles to recover from the

June 28 fire.

"We decided to have a little party to lift up the mood," Luffy told his guests that day. "And we're starting to lift the mood here in Niland the best we can."

**A Welcoming Home**

The Niland wildlife habitat is an oasis situated among nearby rural homes, farmland and undeveloped property, where about 500 Washingtonia palm trees and three relatively large ponds serve as a lush attraction for a variety of local wildlife.

Prior to the devastating fire, it was common to see bobcats, coyotes, skunks, migratory birds, waterfowl snakes,

owls, foxes, and muskrats, to name just some species, at the location, which is certified as wildlife habitat by the National Wildlife Federation.

About a third of the property has been restored and the wildlife appears to be trickling back in, Luffy told local filmmaker and fellow Niland resident Ryan Joseph Perez in a 15-minute video Perez produced and uploaded to YouTube entitled "New Beginnings for a California Wildlife Habitat."

In the video, Luffy details his and his wife's intimate connection to the property, their shared love of animals and the evolu-

tion of the wildlife habitat.

Though his family's connection to the land dates back to the 1980s, Luffy didn't arrive until about the late 1990s, when he purchased a plot next to his father's parcel. Since then, he has seen how farmland and development has encroached on the amount of natural habitat that wildlife has had at its disposal.

"They have a very small place to have their young and it turns out over the years they kind of migrated here," Luffy said in the video.

"I didn't even know that she was in the Slabs. I didn't even know there was a Slab City until this happened," the 41-year-old Nashville resident said of her second cousin, Tommi-Deane Jackson, the little girl she treated as her own growing up and who is today the subject of an active homicide investigation by the Imperial County Sheriff's Office.

Brammer will be in the Imperial Valley toward the end of the month to advocate on behalf of Tommi-Deane in what may prove to be the most high profile of circumstances — she'll be here at the invitation of Rosa Diaz of the Imperial Valley LGBT Resource Center, which is staging a vigil during national Pride Month in memory of Marilyn Monroe Cazares, who was the victim of an as-yet unsolved murder, when the transgender woman's body was found burned in front of an abandoned building in Brawley on July 13, 2020.

Tommi-Deane is described by the Imperial County Sheriff's Office as "nonbinary" or gender nonconforming, none of which Brammer knows much about, but what she does know is that her 21-year-old cousin did not deserve to die, and she feels like she has to do something.

"I want to come to California for that very reason, because I want to bring attention to this case, and there's no attention on it," Brammer said during a phone interview on Saturday afternoon, June 5. "She was a baby, she was a (21)-year-old child, the same age as my daughter. This is my blood cousin, OK."

"But if something like this were to happen to my daughter, I would leave heaven and earth and burn the world down if that's what it took to find out who did this to my child," she said.

There is not a lot known about some of the specifics of Tommi-Deane Jackson's life, as Brammer had only started to reconnect with her cousin after leaving high school. The two had not spoken since before leaving for California.

What Brammer has since learned through one of Tommi-Deane's best friends from high school, the same person who put the Calexico Chronicle in contact with Brammer, is that this biological female was not nonbinary, but had transitioned before leaving his native Nashville and

was living his life as a transgender male.

An identified descendent of the Wyandot Native American tribe, "he really identified more as a two-spirit, trans man. He was indigenous and had the right to claim two-spirit identity," according to the woman, who had last spoken to him in April.

"He went by Poe while he was in the Slabs, but in Nashville, Oliver or Poe was just fine," she said in an email on June 5.

### WHEN A DROWNING'S NOT A DROWNING

**NILAND** — On a Tuesday, May 11, two Coachella Valley Water District workers discovered a body in the swift-moving Coachella Canal in the area around Siphon 9, a little more than a mile northwest of the farthest reaches of Slab City, a crusty artists' enclave known as East Jesus.

The Sheriff's Office activity logs make no mention of the discovery that morning, but coroner investigators dispatch reports show the call came in at 9:38 a.m., Chief Deputy Robert Benavidez explained.

A precise location where the body was retrieved hasn't been revealed, but an individual monitoring radio scanner traffic that morning heard tell of the Coachella water workers attaching a rope to the remains and tying it off to what was likely the siphon to keep the body from going underwater and in place until death investigators could arrive to retrieve the remains.

The Coachella Canal is particularly dangerous, serving as the main tributary that feeds eastern Riverside County with Colorado River water from the All-American and the Imperial Irrigation

District's vast network of canals. Its proximity to Slab City has seen it become the site of several drownings in recent months, the latest of which was about three to four weeks ago when a Slabs resident named "JT," who jumped into the turbulent waters fully clothed to rescue one of his dogs, Blackie, only to perish and show up downstream some days later.

A vigil was reportedly held in the Slabs for JT on Friday night, June 4, a resident in the area said.

Although it was only 75 degrees around 9 in the morning on May 11 when the CVWD employees located a body at Siphon 9, temperatures had already reached 93 degrees the day before, topped out at 95 later in the afternoon May 11, and would near the century mark — 99 degrees — around 4 to 5 p.m. on Wednesday, May 12.

Heat and water can be a coroner investigator's worst enemy, Benavidez said, and by the time the remains were pulled from the canal, the body "was several days old" and "started to decompose," he explained while consulting the coroner's notes.

It's unclear when investigators knew who they were dealing with. But it would not be for another four to seven days after the body was pulled from the water and an autopsy was conducted in San Diego County that all involved knew they had a murder investigation on their hands.

Even now, few details have been released by the Imperial County Sheriff's Office as they don't want to reveal too much in an active, open investigation where no arrests have yet to be made. Sheriff's officials won't even say if they have any persons of interest at the moment.

It was only on the morning

of Wednesday, June 2, when the murder probe went public on the Sheriff's Office Facebook page, posted as a "public assistance request" in the homicide death of Tommi-Deane Jackson.

### A YOUNG MAN MOVES WEST

Known by the nickname "Legion" to folks in the Slabs, Poe Delwyn Black reportedly arrived in "town" — Slab City, that is — in a van with an unidentified male around four months earlier.

"He left Nashville around December 16, 2020. He went with his partner, who I won't name for their privacy. They arrived in the Slabs some time at the end of December or beginning of January," said the close high school friend of Poe's.

Brammer knows nothing of Poe's life in California or the Slabs, only what the unnamed friend has shared with her, which doesn't appear to be all that much either. Tracing a person's path through social media can also prove difficult depending on whether friends who don't want to be identified have deleted their posts or tried to scrub the Internet of any online interactions.

Facebook is how the Sheriff's Office came to identify the body, according to the friend, who implied that Poe Black's acquaintances in the Slabs might not have known that his legal name was Tommi-Deane Jackson. According to the friend, it was at her urging that Poe's mother contacted the Imperial County Sheriff's Office around May 22.

"He had his friends in the Slabs added on his Facebook, and they were posting about his passing. A friend of ours asked if I had seen the posts on his Facebook timeline and I went and checked it out.

This is where I found out that he was deceased," the friend wrote in an email, answering a number of specific questions. "I realized nobody out there was going to know his legal name, so I contacted his family and let them know what had happened and to call the Imperial County Sheriff's Department to identify themselves as his kin.

"Otherwise, he was going to be buried as a Doe. The day after, I was informed that his death was a murder," the friend said.

**Concrete Canals Tell No Tales**

While it might sound strange to the uninitiated how the victim of multiple stab wounds like those found on the body of Poe Black can go undetected as a drowning, but Chief Deputy Benavidez, who oversees the coroner's unit, explained that it's perfectly reasonable.

He described what water and elevated temperature can do in just a few days, turning a body black and making the skin extremely fragile to handle.

Add in the conditions at the Coachella Canal, it becomes even more problematic considering this is a concrete-lined conveyance system moving huge amounts of water at high pressure and high speed.

"A body wants to stay underwater, and its scraping along the bottom of the concrete surface," Benavidez said on Friday, June 4, adding it's not surprising that if the body went into the water around Slab City that it would be found more than a mile north along the canal.

In consulting a map of the area, Siphon 7 is near the Slab City Library, on the southern end of the settlement. East Jesus, at the north, is adjacent to Siphon 8. Poe's remains were found near Siphon 9, about 6,000 feet, or more than 1.1 miles from Siphon 8.

And, Benavidez said, when the body was pulled out, an initial postmortem inspection did reveal "a couple lacerations, but that could have been due to cuts from rebar on the concrete."

When the body was examined under more exhaustive conditions at the contract medical examiner's facility in San Diego County four to seven days later, Benavidez said, the multiple stab wounds were found, and at that point the murder investigation was started immediately, with deputies making multiple visits over successive days to interview Slab City residents.

Again, few details are being released at this point in the investigation.

Poe's cousin, Brammer, and his high school best friend have their theories, and they know what they have been told through family members about the manner of Poe's death, but no one wants to say too much right now, not when a suspect remains at large.

But that's not going to deter Brammer from trying to get her own answers in a few weeks when she intends to find anyone in the Slabs who might have known Poe.

"I'm trying to find out as much as I can because this is my blood. This was like my own daughter, and this is terrible," she said. "This is the worst thing you can imagine happening to a young child."

"I was pretty happy I saw my friends," he said. Although the seniors' prom was organized by a small group of devoted parents, the school itself was able to host a number of events for seniors as well toward the end of the school year, Arevalo said. Those events included a trip to Knotts Berry Farm, an on-campus carnival complete with a taco cart and a movie, a senior breakfast, and a class photo. And they could not have taken place if not for the support of faculty and staff. "The biggest takeaway was that we were able to make things happen for seniors," Arevalo said. "At the end of the day, this means the world to them." To them? Her remarks to her classmates and those present, valedictorian Abigail Garewal said she felt honored to have graduated from Holtville High and that her numerous accomplishments were owed largely to the guidance and support of the "tight-knit" campus community. "Going to school in Holtville has been the best experience we all could of possibly had," Garewal said. And no matter whether graduating seniors had plans to continue their education, seek employment, or join the military, their graduation provided them an opportunity for a fresh start and to define success on their own terms, she said. "As long as you are happy, you are successful," Garewal said. "Be true to yourself." She then closed out her speech by quoting singer-songwriter Nicki Minaj, who said that win or lose one must take ownership of their lives. "Let's be in control from here on out," Garewal said. (Read a related feature story on Garewal and fellow graduate Inez Rosales)

Taking better control of her life is precisely what had allowed 18-year-old Monique Gonzalez to graduate on time. For a while, the milestone seemed out of reach on account of falling grades that had been prompted by some personal problems. "But I raised them up to the point that I could graduate and I'm proud of myself for doing it," Gonzalez said. She now has her sights set on attending a correctional officer academy in Texas this summer. Several relatives of hers that had completed the program, and who now are employed as correctional officers in Calipatria and Blythe, served as the inspiration for her career choice. Despite the inherent dangers of the profession, Gonzalez said she considers herself up to the task and having the requisite mental and physical toughness. "I'm just going to go over there and do everything so I can start working," Gonzalez said.

ty for citizenship, leadership and love for God and country, the national American Legion Auxiliary's website stated. Those eligibility requirements also fit Vera to a T. She and her family have been a fixture every year at community events honoring veterans and members of the armed services. Her family's military service is unassailable. Her father served in the U.S. Air Force for nine years as a Russian linguist, extending the family's unbroken multi-generational streak of having served in the armed forces since the founding of the United States and the Revolutionary War. She is involved with her church's youth group and this week accompanied them to Utah for a retreat. Her penchant for leadership includes having served as the Class of 2022's president for the past two years, as well as for the coming school year. And while she is proud of her mixed heritage, owed to her mother who is a native of Guatemala, she above all else considers herself an American and is extremely appreciative of the freedoms enjoyed in the states. That appreciation has also been further enhanced by the multiple trips that Vera has taken to Guatemala with her family

in past years. "I would say traveling to a different country really changed my perspective," she said. "We're really blessed with resources that we have here compared to other countries." Vera said she credits her selection as the local auxiliary's Girls State delegate to a Holtville High counselor who recommended she apply for the opportunity. And even though older relatives had participated in the program during their high school days, Vera said she was only vaguely familiar with its specifics. However, that quickly changed in preparation for her application and her subsequent virtual interview with members of the Bradley-Keffer auxiliary. "I do like to be politically active and pay attention to what's going on in our country," Vera said. "I think it's very important for young people to do." Nor does Vera come across as an extremely entrenched partisan. Instead, she confesses a preference for understanding both sides of the political spectrum, and a belief that all American citizens are created equal and should be treated with respect, regardless of their race, religion, or gender. "After all, America is a big melting pot with many people," she said. "If you set your mind to it and work hard you will be successful."

## Vikings Fall Short in CIF Semifinal

Calvin Christian Bounces Holtville from Playoffs for Second Year with 62-32 Drubbing

**ESCONDIDO** — The Holtville High School boys' basketball team is tired of seeing Calvin Christian High of Escondido in the playoffs after the Crusaders eliminated the Vikings from the CIF-San Diego Section playoffs for the second consecutive year.

Holtville lost 62-32 in the Division IV semifinals on Tuesday, June 8, after losing 46-29 in Escondido in the Division V quarterfinals in 2020.

On Tuesday, Calvin Christian jumped out to a 20-9 lead at the end of the first quarter, after trailing 9-2 to start the game. The Vikings weren't able to get any offense going against the taller Crusaders, finishing the first half down 33-15.

The Vikings, co-champs of the Imperial Valley League along with Central Union High School, defeated Escondido Charter 57-53 in the quarterfinals on Saturday, June 5, on the Holtville campus to reach the semifinals.

Holtville trailed 24-22 at the half but a big third quarter gave the Vikings a 39-35 lead

heading to the final period where both teams put up 18 points.

"We came out in the third quarter and applied more pressure to them defensively and tried to speed up the game," said Tony Ramos, Holtville's head coach. "We were able to build a lead and then kept fighting them off in the fourth quarter."

Junior Roman Maize paced the Vikings with 16 points, followed by senior Abraham Ramos and sophomore Angel Perez with nine points each.

In the first round of the playoffs on June 1, Holtville routed 14th-seeded El Cajon Valley, 69-45. The Vikings used a big third quarter in that game as well, breaking open a 25-19 halftime lead with a 23-14 advantage in the third period.

Maize paced the Vikings against El Cajon Valley with 18 points, followed by Perez with 17 and senior Roman Ordonez with seven.

The Division IV championship game is set for 4:30 p.m. on Friday, June 9, at Serra High School in San Diego. Calvin Christian will face the winner of Wednesday's other semifinal between Maranatha Christian High of San Diego and High Tech High of San Diego.

The other IVL team still alive in the San Diego Section playoffs is Vincent Memorial Catholic of Calexico who advanced to the Division V championship game on Tuesday with a 49-39 victory over St. Joseph Academy of San Marcos.

The Scots will play in the Division V title game against Crawford High of San Diego at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 10, at Serra High School in San Diego.



Now that the playoffs have arrived, the records go out the window and it becomes a double-elimination tournament for the Vikings as the second-seeded team in the division. Bayfront Charter of Chula Vista is the top seed.

Holtville is scheduled to play a home game on Wednesday, June 9, with time tentatively set for 6 p.m. The opponent will be determined on Monday, June 7, in a play-in game between 10th-seeded Mount Miguel of Spring Valley and seventh-seeded Classical Academy of Escondido.

All four games in the play-in round on Monday are single elimination with the losers out and the winners moving into the

double-elimination tournament.

Other IVL teams in the playoffs this week include Southwest of El Centro as the 12th-seed in the Division I tournament in the play-in game on Monday, June 7, playing in Escondido against fifth-seeded San Pasqual High. If the Eagles win they will travel to face Rancho Bernardo of San Diego in the double-elimination tournament on Wednesday, June 9.

IVL champion Brawley Union High is also in Division I, sitting as the sixth-seed and hosting 11th-seeded Poway in the play-in round on Monday, June 7, for a 6:30 p.m. first pitch in Brawley. If the Wildcats win they will move into the double-elimination tournament and face third-seeded Santana of Santee on Wednesday, June 9.

Lara said that Jimenez could be crowned champion in either the 800 or 1,600 and wouldn't be surprised to see him finish in the top-3 and medal in the 3,200 as well. The senior's qualifying time currently has him first in the 800 and third in the 1,600.

"It's going to be difficult but I want to go out there and get two CIF championships," Jimenez said. "That's what I've been training for and that's what I've been aiming for this year."

Also competing for the Vikings at the Division III championship meet will be freshman Lillian Strahm. The distance runner will be competing in the 3,200-meter (two-mile) race and is the first freshman from Holtville to make it to the championship meet.

"She's running really well and for just being a freshman she doesn't seem bothered by the fact it's a championship meet," Lara said. "We, as her coaches, are still trying to get to know her and learn what training she responds to best and she's just going and there and running."

Holtville High senior Ciera Dammarell qualified for

the championship meet in the shot put and is going in as the sixth-seeded athlete in the event after last week's qualifying meet. Dammarell won the Imperial Valley League title in the shot put, but her effort at the qualifying meet wasn't her best, so Lara has high expectations for her come Saturday.

"I think she has the potential to be top-5 and possibly even top-3 and medal if she can go out there and get a personal-best," he said.

The final athlete competing at the finals for the Vikings is sophomore Julian Reyna who will take part in the triple jump. Lara is hoping the newbie to the triple jump can get into the top-10 as he continues to learn the complicated event.

"He's really just learning the event but he's talented enough that he could have a terrible day and still get a good distance," Lara said.

Between 15 and 20 schools will be competing at the Division III championship meet at Valley Center while the Division II schools will be competing at the same time at Mt. Carmel High School in San Diego and the Division I schools will compete at Del Norte High School in San Diego

son, Holtville's seventh-year head coach. "It's a tough ask to try and go on the road and beat the top-ranked team. We had them on the ropes, we just weren't able to finish."

The Vikings (10-2 overall) trailed 10-9 after the first quarter but rallied to take a 23-22 half-time lead and held a 35-32 lead after the third quarter before being outscored 16-5 in the final period.

Junior Orian Anderson led Holtville with 12 points, seven rebounds and three assists, followed by sophomore Kamryn Walker who finished with 12 points, five rebounds, three assists and three steals. Sophomore Julia Moreno added seven points, six rebounds and five steals and sophomore Skylar Hanson chipped in with

three points and seven rebounds.

The Vikings defeated ninth-seeded Francis Parker High of San Diego 49-46 in the first round of the Division II playoffs in Holtville on Wednesday, June 2.

Holtville jumped out to a 12-1 lead after the first quarter and led 24-8 at halftime. The Lancers rallied back with a big fourth quarter, outscoring the Vikings 26-10 in the final period to draw close.

"We had a 19-point lead after three quarters and just lost focus in the fourth," Anderson said. "Give Francis Parker credit, those girls never gave up and battled all the way to the final second."

Walker led the Vikings with 11 points, 12 rebounds, eight assists and seven steals. Anderson finished with 10 points and five assists and Hanson had 10 points and seven rebounds.

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
