Gene Layton Memorial Pool Makes \$9K Over Summer Season

Swimmers remained until well after dark to enjoy the pool one last time for the season, as the city of Holtville held its last Public Swim Day on Saturday evening, Sept. 3.

Public Swim Days at the Gene Layton Memorial Pool have been a chance for everyone to swim at no cost, with various businesses, public agencies or individual defraying the cost of using the pool through donations.

Among the swimmers on Saturday was 11-year-old Hannah Delong, her younger sister, Charlotte, and their cousin, Madeline Dotson, who made up a giggly trio who enjoyed the final day with their older family members.

"I really liked swimming today... my favorite thing though was getting to spend time with my cousin," Hannah said.

For 10-year-old Charlotte and 9-year-old Madeline, their favorite part of the day was lifeguard Brandon Butler, who took the time during his break to play with them and the other children at the pool.

Butler raced the girls several times, beating them every time despite the large head start he would give them.

"I loved coming here to swim today... My favorite part was racing Brandon," Charlotte said.

Butler and the three girls were far from strangers, according to the sisters' mother, Katie Delong, who explained that Butler had worked with the three girls for years as part of the Holtville swim team.

"It's really easy to get to know people in Holtville, because everyone knows everyone,"

Butler said. "There is an overarching knowledge of people in this community, it makes it easy to get along with everyone."

The end of the season will likely come with a certain amount of sadness for the children who enjoyed the Public Swim Days, but for the city of Holtville, the summer was a success.

Since the reopening of the Gene Layton Memorial Pool on June 10, about 2,200 visitors swam in the refurbished pool, Holtville City Manager Nick Wells stated via text on Tuesday, Sept. 6.

Over the course of the summer, Wells estimated that the pool earned around \$9,000 between daily swim charges, the sponsored "Public Swim" days, and a donation from the Imperial Irrigation District.

Residents in Holtville we're charged \$2 to be able to swim in the pool for the day, while non-residents were charged \$4. Over the summer, these charges earned the city of Holtville some \$1,600.

In addition to the daily use charges, the city also had 20 "free swim" days at \$200 a day that were sponsored, earning the city in additional \$4,000 in revenue.

Imperial County District 5 Supervisor Ray Castillo also joined in making the pool more accessible for everyone by sponsoring every Wednesday and Thursday for the entire summer, earning another \$2,400 for the city.

"The IID also donated \$5,000, some of which was used to offset some of the 'free swim' days," Wells wrote.

Woman Promotes Firearm Safety, Proficiency

Many Shooting League Members Cite Desire to Want to Protect Themselves, Family

EL CENTRO — As someone who was not raised around firearms, it was hard for Imperial Valley resident Jennifer Goodsell to imagine she would ever own one.

But now, as the proud owner of a Glock 19 9mm, Goodsell is not only well versed about how to handle a handgun safely and responsi-

bly but has a membership at a local shooting range, too.

"This is kind of my thing," Goodsell said during a break in shooting practice at the indoor

range at Border Tactical on Tuesday, Sept. 6. "I guess you can say this is my hobby."

However, Goodsell said she doesn't have any immediate plans

to take up recreational shooting or hunting on public lands. Rather, the motivation for purchasing a handgun and wanting to become comfortable with its handling was more of a safety concern.

"For me it's personal protection," she said. "It all goes back to emergency preparedness, knowing the state of the world that we're in, not wanting to be afraid of a weapon."

For Goodsell, and a host of other local women, the road to firearm proficiency began in April, when a local gun enthusiast sent them a mass invitation to an introductory handgun training class at the gun store and shooting range in El Centro.

'72 Babe Ruth All-Stars to Reunite

Championship Brawley Team Featured Players from All Over Imperial Valley, Including Calipatria, Calexico and Holtville

Giants and Cardinals.

"I had no idea how good of a team we did or didn't have,"

said team manager Robert Walk, who would become the league's youngest manager to win a tournament championship. "I didn't realize how much talent we had until we started practicing and playing the games."

The all-stars of '72, Walk said, were blessed with a good defense, pitching and a little bit of luck.

And respect, said coach John "Gordy" Diaz.

"That was one of our biggest things. Before anything else, respect all your teammates and your coaches and you're going to go a long way," Diaz said. "And we did."

At the time, Walk was a year removed from having graduated from Calipatria High School and had coached the Calipatria Dodgers team for two years prior. Diaz was in his third year at Brawley Union High and had coached the Brawley Yankees the season of 1972.

Both admitted in a 1972 local newspaper article about the selection of the all-star team that the teams they had respectively coached that season lost as often as they had won.

The article, one of many me-

ments that some team members saved, further disclosed that both Walk and Diaz were selected from the local Babe Ruth League's officials to lead the 13-year-olds because "everybody else was busy."

"We had a heck of a season that year," Diaz said. "Nobody has ever done it again."

In the final game of the final tournament, the all-stars faced off against the Mexicali All-Stars. Diaz said he recalled seeing the Mexicali players exit the team bus before the game and recognized some of them as being older than 13.

They recognized him as well from his time playing with them in years prior and asked that he not divulge that some of their team members exceeded the age limit.

"I'm not going to say anything," Diaz said he told them, before adding, "instead, we're going to beat you."

Which they did, 15-1, ending the Mexicali All-Star's three-year winning streak at the Pacific Southwest Region tournament.

Team members view their final tournament win as the equivalent of a World Series win.

First, they had to win the league's district tournament in

San Clemente, then the Southern California Region's tourney in Ventura before advancing to the Pacific Southwest tourney in Wasco, located about 20 miles northwest of Bakersfield.

"There were no more tournaments after that, so we self-declared ourselves world champions," said Romualdo "Rom" Medina, who played third base and was affectionately known by his teammates as "Rommy."

The team's winning streak attracted the attention of the San Diego Union newspaper, as well. The article quoted Pacific Southwest Regional director Del Bowles as saying the Brawley All-Stars "were the finest 13-year-olds in the recent history of the league."

The team members also "kept clear heads under the most adverse conditions," Bowles was quoted as saying in the newspaper's edition of Aug. 20, 1972.

Fellow all-star teammate and wisecracking color commentator Craig Kidwell said he remembers some of those adverse conditions involved the team's Latino players being the target of racial slurs.

"They took some stuff that they shouldn't have had to take," said Kidwell, formerly of Brawley and now residing in Fort Worth,

Texas. "But they fought back the best way they could — they whooped their (opponents') butt on the baseball field."

The Babe Ruth All-Star team's winning of three consecutive tournaments hardly registered in social circles beyond the league or teammates' friends and families. But it did earn them a steak dinner and awards presentation that was hosted by the Brawley Lions Club.

"No team did that in the 50 years before and no team has done it 50 years later," said Kidwell, who acknowledged he was just a "benchwarmer" whose only at-bat that summer ended with a three-pitch strikeout. "It's probably the best team in the last century that came out of the Valley."

The Golden Jubilee

Despite the bonds that the all-stars created during that fateful summer of 1972, many admitted to having lost touch with their fellow team members as the years wore on, even though most still live in the Valley.

"We see each other once in a while, not very often," said former team pitcher Raul Gradilla, of Calexico.

To counter that, Medina has organized a team reunion the weekend of the Cattle Call Rodeo in November, including an appearance together on a parade float.

A dinner banquet is scheduled as well for that weekend's Saturday, as is a gathering in the park the following day for teammates and their families.

Recently, Medina, Gradilla and coaches Walk and Diaz gathered at La Fonda restaurant in El Centro to catch up with one another. Joining them virtually over the phone were Serna, Kidwell and David Zuniga, who now resides in the San Diego area.

Medina said he had been considering organizing a team reunion for some time, but that it hadn't materialized until now.

La Brucherie Road Project Works Nerves

Imperial Residents Have Strong Opinions on Three-month Closure Due to Widening

IMPERIAL — Maria Hernandez lives west of La Brucherie Road in the hive of single-family homes south of Aten Road that finds itself cut off from a main route to shopping, banking, and more for at least three months.

Hernandez was out walking her dog in the area on Sept. 3 as work was getting underway on improvements to the heavily used and heavily damaged La Brucherie Road that connects several hundred residents in the area, both north and south of Aten, to El Centro.

While Hernandez said she was initially excited about the improvements, an unanswered question on a city social media account left her concerned about the speed limit on the reconstructed road that will be widened to four lanes.

"I saw someone ask about the speed limit on one of the city's posts ... now I am worried about how fast people will go down the road and whether it will be safe to walk my dog there," Hernandez said.

The post Hernandez referred to was made by Steve Kura on the live stream of a special Imperial City Council meeting on Aug. 23,

GUEST COLUMN: Lithium Extraction Must Not Cause Us More Problems

We refuse to be experimental zones for climate change programs that have unproven benefits and unknown environmental impacts, such as lithium extraction. We're two community advocates and concerned citizens of North Shore and Salton City, asking for our communities to be recognized in the decision-making process.

We are concerned that the profits that will result from lithium development are more important to decision-makers than our health. The lives of immigrants, children, and low-income people of color are worth more than the profits of lithium extraction. We experience the climate crisis every day through extreme heat, storms, high energy costs, and poor air quality.

Climate solutions must not cause us more problems.

Over a year ago, we began to ask the regional, state, and federal agencies to keep us informed and involved. This request continues to be unmet.

Government agencies say they are moving forward with lithium extraction the "right way," but our experience has been that the Lithium Valley Commission and local, state, and federal elected representatives are moving forward without lis-

tening to us. To us, the right way means that every resident living around the Salton Sea region must be informed of the impacts of lithium extraction and have the opportunity to engage in the development of a strategy that benefits and does not hurt their neighborhoods.

Lithium's promise of profits requires a workforce. Communities like North Shore and Salton City are home to hardworking people who are the lifeline of the agricultural and tourism economies in eastern Riverside and Imperial counties. But we are more than a workforce. We deserve equitable economic development opportunities that improve our quality of life.

More underpaid and exploitative jobs that make us sick are not worth it.

We ask all government agencies to work with the entire community, not just a select few, on plans and policies that will affect all of us. A report prepared by the Lithium Valley Commission is due to the State of California in October. It will determine a path forward on lithium extraction and with it, a path forward for all of our communities.

We request that the Lithium Valley Commission consider the

community recommendations we've continuously voiced regarding the process for developing the report and for what should be in the report. This is an opportunity to do things differently and actively include community perspectives.

We cannot continue to accept a culture of neglect toward our communities. We know lithium extraction and the development of a supply chain are coming; so we ask for the truth about their impacts and a seat at the table to

help protect our neighborhoods.

Cecilia Dora Armenta has lived with her family of four in Salton City for 29 years. She is an active member in her local church where she volunteers as a catechist. Cecilia is also a member of West Shores Lion's Club Chapter and Coachella Valley Parents, as well as an active community partner with Leadership Counsel for Justice and Accountability.

Elizabeth Jaime has been a resident of North Shore for 12

years. She is a concerned mother of two children with asthma. Elizabeth is an active community leader through her work with Lideres Campesinas and Alianza Nacional de Campesinas in agricultural worker rights, domestic violence prevention, and pesticide regulation advocacy.

At-Promise House Creates Promising Students

Central Union High School's At-Promise House Program Reforms Struggling Students into Students with a Promising Future

EL CENTRO — When 16-year-old juniors Estrella Silva and Jesus Valenzuela discovered they wouldn't be promoted to the next grade level, they signed up for the inaugural year of a program called At-Promise House, which gave them the skills they need for a better future.

Silva and Valenzuela's story began in the summer of 2021, when they learned they would not be moving into the 10th grade without joining the brand-new program at the Central Union High School District.

After a year in At-Promise House, both students are on track for graduation as well as being members of the yearbook team, with Valenzuela boasting a 3.3 grade-point average.

At-Promise House takes students within the district who do not have enough credits to advance and places them into smaller, more focused core classes to create a "school within a school" model, and then allows them to make up the credits at an accelerated pace.

These classes have a maximum of 10 students to one teacher or instructional aide, which allows for more one-on-

one guidance by the educators, which was one of the primary reasons Valenzuela gave for his current success.

"The smaller classes really helped a lot because it helps you focus more ... the teachers focused more on us and that helped us a lot and made school easier," Valenzuela said.

During the 2021-2022 school year, At-Promise House took 56 students who had zero to 15 credits to participate in the program. At the end of the year, 47 of the students made amazing progress in earning credits, with 21 of the students earning 80 or more credits, and an additional 26 students earning 60 or more credits.

More Than Just Academics

At-Promise House is more than simply smaller classrooms, however, as its aim is to create a more supportive environment for students who are struggling by teaching them skills that will help them cope with issues outside academics.

After the 2022-2023 At-Promise House "Welcome Back" Party on Friday, Sept. 2, At-Promise House's English teacher Ricardo Tostado explained that many of the students are dealing with personal issues which impacts their

Vikings Wake Up Late to Edge Ensenada

Winning TD Comes With 23 Seconds Left

HOLTVILLE — Trailing 8-0 going into the fourth quarter of a lackluster performance against CETYS of Ensenada, Holtville High School football coach Jason Turner probably wanted to pull the plug on the lights at Birger Field here on Saturday, Sept. 3.

Then with 11:41 left in the fourth quarter, the lights did go out at the field, causing a 15-minute delay while some breakers had to be switched back on so the lights could come on again.

After the delay, the Vikings (3-0 overall) went on two touchdown drives and edged CETYS 15-8. The winning touchdown came

on a 44-yard run from senior Zephan Duarte with 23 seconds left.

“That outage gave us time to regroup and talk about some things and made the difference for us,” said Turner, now in his sixth season as head coach of the Vikings.

“We looked sharp and we looked focused in practice all week and then we get out here and there’s no energy and the guys look lethargic.”

Up 8-0, the Zorros looked poised to increase their lead on the first play of the fourth quarter with the ball

at the Vikings’ 8-yard-line. CETYS’ quarterback Victor Ayala dropped back to pass but got drilled by Holtville senior Elliot Ortiz, causing a fumble that was recovered by the Vikings’ Alexis Roldan.

The turnover gave Holtville the ball at its own 12-yard-line but before the Vikings could run a play the lights at Birger Field went out.

When play resumed, the Holtville offensive line seemed refreshed and led a 14-play, 88-yard drive that featured 13 rushing plays and one pass. On a fourth-and-9 from the Zorros’ 14-yard-line, the Vikings called senior Chad Goodsell’s favorite play.



Scots Score Late, Beat El Cajon Valley

EL CAJON — After surrendering a 21-point lead, the Vincent Memorial Catholic High School football team scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to beat El Cajon Valley 35-21 in a nonleague game here on Friday, Sept. 2.

The Scots (3-0 overall) jumped out to a 21-0 lead only to see the Braves battle back and tie the score in the third quarter. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Vincent Memorial junior quarterback Jacobo Elias hit senior receiver Armando Apodaca for an 18-yard touchdown to regain the lead.

Elias finished 20-of-30 passing for 167 yards and three touchdowns. He now has eight passing touchdowns on the young season.

Up next for the Scots, they will host Castle Park High of Chula Vista at 7 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 9, at Eagle Field on the Southwest High School campus in El Centro.

‘DOGS TAKE BITE OUT OF CETYS, 31-6

CALEXICO — The Calexico High School football team got three touchdowns from sophomore quarterback Sean Torres to beat CETYS of Mexicali, 31-6, in a nonleague contest at Ward Field here on Friday, Sept. 2.

Torres threw for two touchdowns and ran for another in his first career start for the Bulldogs (3-0 overall). The sophomore was thrown into action the week prior when senior quarterback David Esquer injured his knee.

Torres finished with 141 yards passing against the Zorros. Junior Andres Castro was Calexico’s leading rusher with 92 yards on 12 carries and senior running back Zeus Pradis finished with 54 yards on seven carries in limited first-half action.

The Bulldogs travel to San Diego to face O’Farrell Charter School at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 8, in a nonleague matchup.

Reyna Tops List for Vikings at Fleet Feet

SAN DIEGO — Holtville High School sophomore Ashley Reyna was the top Viking runner at the 52-team Fleet Feet Cross Country Invitational at Canyon Crest Academy in San Diego on Saturday, Sept. 3.

Reyna finished the 1.5-mile sophomore race in 27th place (10:00.40) among the 128 runners entered in the event. Teammate Clara Strahm (11:28.90) also competed in the race and finished in 91st place.

The sophomore girls’ race was the only one of the day with the 1.5-mile distance. All other races were 3-mile distance.

In the boys’ sophomore race, the Vikings’ top finisher was Dion Johnston (22:10.60) who was in 118th place out of 174 runners. In the junior race, Holtville’s Ruben Jimenez (21:29.20) finished in 105th place out of 145 runners while teammate Brady Walker (22:23.10) finished in 117th.

In the boys’ senior race, Holtville’s Bryan Aguirre (19:57.80) finished in 154th place out of 212 competitors, while teammate Saul Banda-Donato (21:13.50) was 182nd.

More than 50 local women attended those initial classes, giving rise to the informal group known as the Imperial Valley League of Women Shooters.

"That class was the first time I ever handled a weapon," Goodsell said, "and I've been coming every Tuesday ever since. It's a great stress reliever, it's a lot of fun."

The League of Women Shooters meets weekly at the indoor range to increase their comfort with handguns and hone their shooting skills with the help of the store's range master.

Nor does the group's formation appear to be out of the ordinary.

These days, new gun owners are likely to be women. They also accounted for about half of gun purchases nationwide between 2019 and 2021, according to a 2021 study from Harvard's School of Public Health.

Yet, a news release on the university's School of Public Health website acknowledged that in households with guns, the risk of suicide can increase as much as fivefold.

Safety is a key focus of the league's practice sessions, as is situational awareness, which instructs shooters to be aware of their surroundings, their intended target and what lies beyond that target, members said.

"One thing that you learn is that a gun doesn't do anything that you don't tell it to do," Goodsell said. "It's not going to shoot itself, it's not going to load itself."

Getting the women together for the beginner's handgun training class in April was the idea of Holtville resident Judy Abatti.

She said she had compiled a list of about 20 prospective participants who in the past couple years

had expressed an interest in learning more about firearms for the purposes of protecting themselves and their homes.

"There's a demand," Abatti said. "People want to feel safe in their home. As women we just need to be prepared to be able to take care of ourselves and our children."

When the time came to organize the training classes, Abatti notified the women on her list and advised them to bring a friend or two. More than 50 women ended up taking the course, which had to be split into two separate classes to accommodate the large group.

"I was very pleased with the turnout," Abatti said.

The initial classes were taught by Donald Wharton, a local firearms instructor, and Gary Fritz, a retired Navy SEAL. It typically takes about 18 months to two years for a person to become proficient with a firearm, Abatti said.

For that reason, League of Women Shooters members are encouraged to attend the Tuesday evening shooting practices at the indoor range as often as possible.

"We decided we were going to do this evening practice to keep all the ladies proficient and help them gain confidence and proficiency on their ability to handle the weapons," Abatti said in a recent phone interview. "A lot of gun handling is mental and just like any other sport or activity takes practice to remain proficient."

Nearly half of the league's members own their own firearm. A considerable number of them hadn't ever handled a firearm prior to their participation in the training class. Now, Abatti is making plans to organize an advance shooting class for members, as well as courses to obtain a state Concealed Carry Weapons license.

The informal group's membership consists of about a third who are young mothers, many middle-aged women, some retirees,

and a couple women in their 70s.

From the time she was 14 years old, Valley resident Deborah Chastain had had a deep fear of firearms. That dread was due to having witnessed a group of intoxicated individuals improperly handle and shoot a revolver while inside of a home.

Eventually, one individual, fueled by drunken bravado, placed the revolver against his head and pulled the trigger multiple times, until it struck a loaded chamber.

"I've always been afraid of guns," Chastain said after she finished practicing shooting her Glock 26 9mm at paper silhouette targets set up at various distances at the indoor range. "I started coming to just get over my fear of guns."

Chastain said she has not missed any Tuesday practice sessions that the league has hosted since its initial training course in April. And her accuracy with her handgun has improved during that time.

A paper target with the silhouette of a human torso that Chastain

has set up at a distance of five yards contained multiple bullet holes that could be considered fatal. A second paper target she had set up at seven yards, less so.

Chastain, who works with Abatti and whose daughter, Chanel Chastain, is the general manager at Border Tactical, said she also plans to take classes to obtain a Concealed Carry Weapons (CCW) permit.

"I don't want to carry a gun because I want to shoot people," Chastain said. "I just want to feel safe and be able to protect myself."

Although she had grown up in a family where guns and recreational shooting were commonplace, Valley resident Theresa Robertson said she didn't feel the need to own a firearm until recently. The reason to do so stemmed largely from wanting to protect herself and her household.

Her initial purchase was a 38-caliber revolver because she thought it would be easy to load in comparison to a handgun that uses a magazine. The revolver ended

up packing quite a kick, prompting Robertson to consider soon buying a Glock.

Both will end up being stored in a locked gun safe in her home.

"The key to it is the safety," Robertson said after practicing shooting at Border Tactical's indoor range along with other league members.

At Border Tactical, it's not just the women affiliated with the Imperial Valley League of Women Shooters that are utilizing its indoor range, said general manager Chanel Chastain.

The current and turbulent state of affairs throughout the country appears to be driving more women to want to purchase firearms and learn about firearm safety, she said in a recent phone interview.

Most will practice at the range with targets set at a distance of five to seven yards.

"It's for home defense," Chastain said, "when an assailant is usually close."

So far, he said he's been able to reach most of the team's total of 18 all-stars and alternates. They include Billy Maness, Joe Gerardo, Kelly Boyd, Sam Underwood, Mike Ochoa, Robert Presley, Richard Church, Ralph Garcia, Kelly Boyd and Gene Bumbera.

Two former players, Philip Cerda of Holtville and John Gutierrez of Calexico have since passed away. Efforts to reach Samuel Perez of Brawley and Jose Luqui of Holtville had been unsuccessful when some of the team members and coaches gathered for dinner on Aug. 25.

Medina said he is also planning to petition to have the Brawley Babe Ruth League 13-year-old All-Stars of 1972 admitted to the Imperial Valley Baseball Network's Hall of Fame.

Yet, even in the absence of any formal recognition, some team members said they feel their participation in the tournament

50 years ago has proven to be a sufficient enough reward and motivation to succeed as adults.

"After the tournament we came home very confident in our selves and skills," said Serna, who went on to play for the Seattle Mariners between 1980 to 1986. "We had the ability to do more than expected or we realized that we could do. All it is hard work."

As adults, many of the team's former players have gone on to reap the rewards of their hard work, with some recently retiring after lengthy careers with various local public agencies, said Medina, who has been Calipatria's city manager for many years.

Kidwell, the self-professed benchwarmer, said his participation on the team also had a profound influence on the type of person he was to become.
